Congratulations to Dimitris who was awarded 2nd place.
- Ben Swallow been awarded a grant (~ £4.5k) from the *eastBIO Doctoral Training Partnership* to support a summer student on a Research Experience Placement. The eight week project will work on statistical approaches to 'Long-term monitoring of survival in Trinidad birds through a mark-recapture study' with Co-I Steve Hubbard from the University of Dundee.
- Deborah Kent and Tom Elsden have been awarded *STFC Knowledge Exchange Institutional Award* funding of £16k for a project 'Sharing the history and science of total solar eclipses'. This will combine the School's research in Solar Theory and History of Mathematics to create a digital resource about the history of eclipse expeditions together with frontiers in solar science. Deborah has also been awarded £2k from the University's *EDI Project Fund*, to be match-funded through the History Group's INI Network grant to create a literature review for historically informed EDI work in mathematics.
