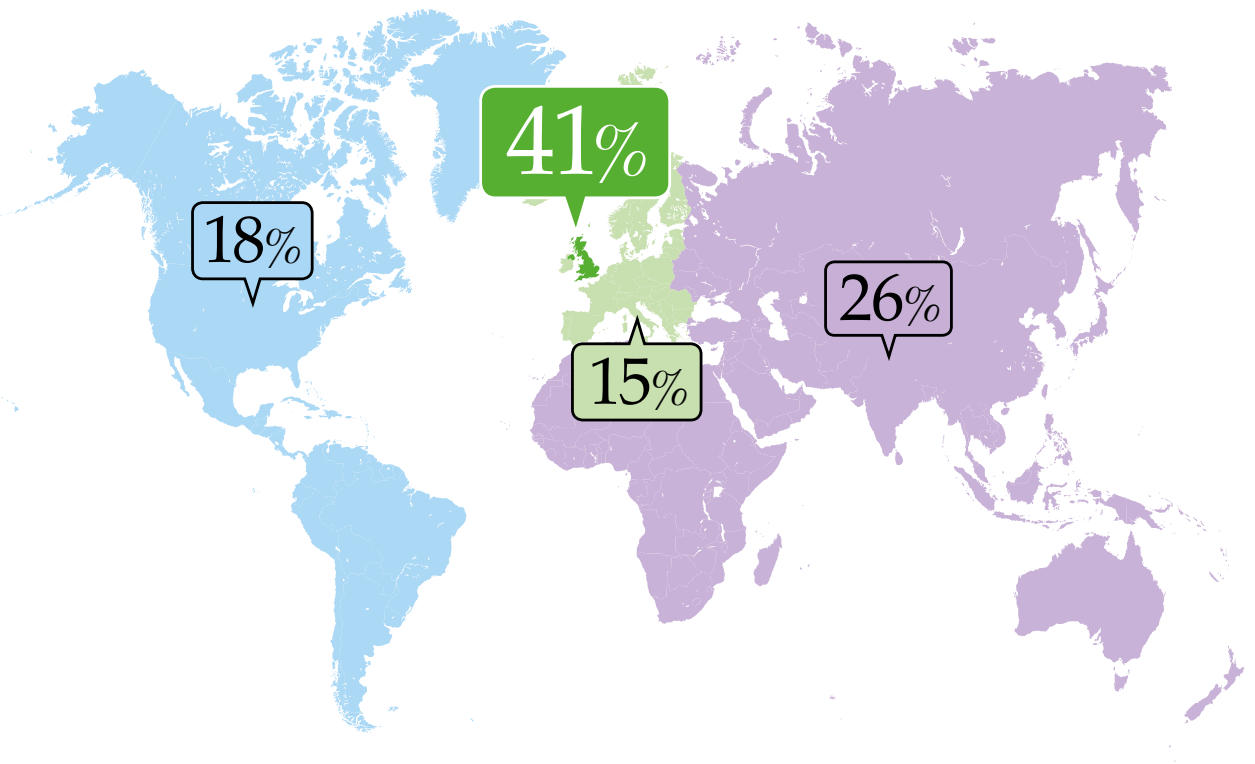

Our closest international airport is Edinburgh. From here you can fly to destinations across the UK and Europe, and catch flights to the USA, Canada and hubs in the Middle East.

Your Masters degree will introduce you to people from around the world, allowing you to make lasting connections with both your peers and academic staff. Students come to enhance their knowledge, gain a qualification and leave with networks and experiences that last a lifetime. Our teaching methods and opportunities for extracurricular skills development all contribute to the quality of your degree and your future prospects.

Entrepreneurial St Andrews

Professional development opportunities for research postgraduates are available through coaching and tutoring roles on the Summer Teams Enterprise Programme (STEP) and other taught modules.

Programmes for careers in research and academia

Whether you are looking for a one-year **research Masters** programme, a **PhD** or a step in between, our programmes will put you in control, helping you make an **impact** on the latest research and **innovation** in your field.

Our research is considerable for a university of our size. According to the latest UK Research Excellence Framework (REF) from 2021, more than 88% of research carried out by the University of St Andrews is world-leading or internationally excellent.

St Andrews offers you an intensive research environment, which is a vital step in your journey to a career in research and academia. Pursuing a specialism is a fulfilling path to undertake, and our research degrees are fully supervised and integrated into the research interests of our academic staff. At St Andrews you will be contributing to the ground-breaking research we produce and making a significant contribution to the development of your academic field. Our international reputation is reflective of the quality of our education; from day one you will also be involved with leading researchers and the ongoing active research into your subject area or research field.

We are internationally recognised for our research specialisms and the University supports a variety of world-class, often cross-discipline or cross-institutional, research centres and institutes.

The impact of our research has led to changes or improvements in local and global policy and law, health and welfare, the economy, culture, technology and the environment. Our online research portal highlights the work in each of our academic Schools from the local to the global, showcasing our work across disciplines with research impact, public engagement, stories and blogs. It also gives you case studies and examples of current active areas of research, as well as a list of our research centres and institutes to help you decide in which area to specialise.

Taught programmes



One-to-one discussion, School of English

From **Masters programmes** to certificates, our in-person and online postgraduate study options will provide you with an **invaluable** opportunity to expand your **academic** expertise and continue your **professional development**.

Whether you are looking to gain a full Masters degree or a Postgraduate Certificate, study in St Andrews full time, or flexibly online, our postgraduate community has a place for you.

Our taught degrees are more specialised than you will have experienced at undergraduate level, and you will quickly find yourself more integrated with the academic staff. Programmes have a substantial taught element with additional emphasis on independent research and, where relevant, practical work.

Your degree is usually completed by an extended dissertation or project which is supervised. Although challenging, it will demonstrate your research skills and scholarly expertise.

Master of Letters (MLitt)

The Master of Letters degree is a postgraduate degree awarded by universities like St Andrews, where the Master of Arts is traditionally awarded as an undergraduate qualification.

Lasting for one full year, two-thirds of your degree will be taught modules and the remaining third comprises a dissertation, normally completed in the final months of the programme.

Master of Science (MSc)

The Master of Science programmes are offered in science subjects or those with a practical component.

MSc programmes involve two semesters of taught modules and independent research, plus an extended project or dissertation where you can further explore a topic of your choosing.

Master of Research (MRes)

The Master of Research programmes, despite the title, are one-year taught degrees that equip students with essential research skills for those

interested in continuing their education with a PhD or doing a research focused career.

The programme consists of two semesters of taught modules followed by a dissertation in the final semester.

Enter a new subject area

The Business School, Philosophy, Psychology and some interdisciplinary studies programmes provide opportunities to study a completely new subject without prior relevant or subject-related experience.

The Conversion in Philosophy Graduate Diploma is for those who wish to pursue the study of philosophy at postgraduate level but have studied little or no philosophy in their undergraduate degree. It builds a firm foundation for those looking to undertake research in philosophy.

The MSc in Psychology is a conversion route for students who hold an undergraduate Honours degree in a subject other than psychology. The course equips students with the necessary skills to pursue a research degree at MPhil or PhD level in psychology or to go on to a clinical training programme.

Postgraduate Diplomas and Certificates

Some programmes also offer the option of a Postgraduate Diploma (the taught component of an MLitt or MSc) or a Postgraduate Certificate (half of the taught component of an MLitt or MSc). These programmes would suit someone looking to develop their skills but not undertake the final project or dissertation of a Masters programme.

Flexible online programmes



Learn from anywhere with our online postgraduate study options

Our tailored **online programmes** are designed to allow you to **achieve your potential**, to **expand your knowledge and skills**, and to **advance your career**.

Learn at a pace and in a way that suits you, wherever you are.

Our interactive online postgraduate programmes are ideal if you are looking to develop your skills and advance your career. The online postgraduate programmes are tailored towards those who are interested in further study that fits around their current lifestyle. If you want to join the St Andrews community without having to leave home, our online programmes are the right fit. One thing that our students have in common, no matter where they are or where they are from, is that they are extraordinary individuals. Our diverse student life and community reflects that.

With multiple exit routes and modules specifically designed for online learning, these programmes are tailored to students who are looking to undertake Masters-level study on a flexible basis. On our online programmes you will undertake more specialised study than that at undergraduate level, and you will quickly find yourself integrated with the academic staff, even though you are not physically in St Andrews. Learn through a mix of led and independent study, with synchronous and asynchronous teaching. You will have the opportunity, depending on your path of study, to choose from a range of optional modules to help tailor your programme to your interests.



Explore our online programmes

As an online learner you will be part of our vibrant student community. You can connect online or, if you are ever in St Andrews, join us in-person. As an online student you can:

- Use online library resources, with 24/7 access to journals, e-books and electronic databases. You can chat to our library staff online (9am-5pm UK time).
- Attend a range of concerts online or improve your playing skills with one-to-one virtual lessons from the Music Centre (costs apply).
- Connect with Student Services to look after your mental health, wellbeing and more (learn more on page 30).
- Connect with our Chaplaincy through livestreamed services.

Master of Letters (MLitt)

Online MLitt degrees are achieved within three years of flexible study, depending on the programme. Two thirds of your degree will be taught modules and the remaining third comprises a dissertation.

Master of Science (MSc)

Online MSc degrees are achieved within three years of flexible study, depending on the programme. Two-thirds of your degree will be taught modules and independent research, and the remaining third comprises an extended project or dissertation.

Postgraduate Certificate (PgCert)

Postgraduate Certificates are achieved within a maximum of one year, depending on the programme. PgCert applicants can commit to the PgDip, MLitt or MSc routes at a later date.

Postgraduate Diploma (PgDip)

Postgraduate Diplomas are achieved within a maximum of two years, depending on the programme. PgDip applicants can commit to the full MLitt or MSc routes at a later date.

Research programmes



Graduation procession

Research programmes involve periods of **intense research** and independent study. At St Andrews your degree will be supervised by an expert in your field of study, and your research will **contribute** to the development of your **academic discipline**.

Whatever your chosen discipline, you will find yourself closely integrated with teaching staff, giving you plenty of opportunities to network with top scholars at both St Andrews and other universities. Your research will be supervised by leading academics, and you will have access to state-of-the-art facilities and resources needed to help you achieve your ambitions.

Master of Science by Research (MSc(Res))
Master of Studies by Research (MSt(Res))

If your intention is to progress onto a research programme, St Andrews offers several Master by Research degrees. These are designed to provide advanced training in research techniques and skills through a year-long project. By the end of the year you will be confident and qualified to progress onto a research career.

Master of Fine Arts (MFA)

This two-year programme is run by the School of English's Creative Writing research group. In your first year you will be taught through technical seminars, workshops and individual tuition. In the second year you will produce a substantial body of work under the supervision of a leading academic.

Master of Philosophy (MPhil)

This is a stepping stone between a one-year Masters and doctoral level degrees and takes two years to complete. The first year of the programme comprises taught classes with the second year being dedicated to further guided research and writing a thesis.

Doctor of Philosophy (PhD)

This research degree usually takes three-and-a-half to four years of full-time study. The qualification is achieved upon submission and

defence of a substantial thesis of original research. You will be supported by a dedicated supervisor throughout your studies.

The Engineering Doctorate (EngD)

This is a four-year degree programme with a strong industry focus. A substantial amount of time is spent on research, usually on a placement with a sponsor company, with other taught elements of the programme delivered at St Andrews.

The Professional Doctorate (DProf)

This programme is of variable length and is obtained while in full-time employment by the submission of a portfolio of work representing an outstanding level of professional practice development.

Further support

St Andrews is a member of Vitae, the global leader in the professional development of researchers. You will gain free access to Vitae's Researcher Development Framework, which helps you to identify strengths and areas for your personal and professional development.

We also encourage you to attend conferences in your field of interest, providing you with a fantastic opportunity to expand your network. The University can provide travel bursaries to support you. You will also have the opportunity to present your research at regular seminars organised by academic Schools, which will allow you to present and discuss your work in a supportive environment.

Academic English Pre-sessional Courses

The University offers academic literacy and English language courses leading into your degree programme. These are specifically designed to help you develop and extend your ability to use English effectively in the context of your academic discipline. We introduce you to the University's facilities, including the Library and Student Services, and you will experience social and cultural life at St Andrews early so you can start your degree with confidence. All postgraduate students who use English as an additional language can apply for the four-week course, while the ten-week course is reserved for taught postgraduate students whose offers are conditional on providing evidence of English language ability. Both the four- and ten-week pre-sessional courses can be used to satisfy the English language elements of a conditional offer to study in selected Schools at St Andrews. Application information and entry requirements for these programmes can be found online.

The **four-week course** provides a focus on developing the academic language and the English language skills you will need. Learning the conventions of essay writing, planning, structuring, drafting and using sources critically is a key component of the course, and one-to-one feedback helps you to develop your abilities. Lectures and seminars delivered by staff from various Schools in the University allow you to build on your listening, note-taking and speaking skills.

The **ten-week course** develops your academic English language skills, including presentation and writing skills. There are lectures and seminars across a range of subject areas which help you improve your listening, note-taking and speaking skills. You will also become used to different lecturing styles and gain confidence in this new teaching environment.

Learning and Writing Centre

This centre provides free academic support throughout the year for all students, including those who use English as a second or additional language. The centre offers workshops on critical thinking, academic writing, grammar, listening, pronunciation and speaking, as well as one-to-one tutorials, and a range of online resources. For doctoral students, support is available to help build research communication skills, including presentation delivery, and writing your thesis, conference abstracts and papers for publication.

Community

The Graduate School at St Leonard's College forms the heart of our postgraduate community at St Andrews. The social side of postgraduate student life offers a broad range of activities from Postgraduate Cafes to pub quizzes, special events and many opportunities to network and experience the town with like-minded individuals.

Academic talks and lectures

Throughout the year there is a wide range of talks, lectures and seminars which are open for you to join, featuring guest speakers and academics from across the University and beyond. Topics vary throughout the year, focusing on the global impact of the University's research and the various specialisms of visiting speakers.

The town

St Andrews is a truly special Scottish coastal town. Measuring barely three miles end-to-end, and combining its medieval and contemporary features, St Andrews has a fascinating history and offers a unique combination of ancient and modern, local and global with a distinctly cosmopolitan air. Our location on the east coast of Fife also means we have some beautiful beaches, fresh air and easy access to many outdoor spaces. The town is also well connected to the rest of the UK and beyond, with easy transport links via the town's bus station and the nearby train station at Leuchars.

The Students' Association

At St Andrews you automatically become a member of the Students' Association and over 20 subcommittees under its umbrella. The subcommittees support a variety of activities, ranging from volunteering and charity work, to debate, radio, and On the Rocks (a student-run arts festival). The subcommittees include BAME, LGBT+, Disabled Students' Network, and Carers, Commuters, Mature and Flexible Learners Forum among others. You can also join any of the 140+ student societies for different faiths, cultures, interests and hobbies.

The Students' Association independently represents all students at the University, with five elected Executive Officers and 2 Postgraduate Officers whose remits cover everything from wellbeing to student development and events. Democratically elected Class Representatives are supported by the Postgraduate Taught and Postgraduate Research Presidents and the full-time President of Education.

Study facilities

As a postgraduate student, you will have access to a range of **libraries, facilities** and **study areas** throughout the University. This includes research rooms and dedicated spaces in academic Schools, letting you find a **study environment that suits you**.

Our extensive collections include archives of rare books, photographs, films, artworks and historical artefacts, all of which are accessible to students.

Dedicated postgraduate study spaces and resources

The Main Library, in the town centre, is the largest of the University libraries with long opening hours and access to a wide range of resources, including plenty of computers. There are newly designed and refurbished spaces including a dedicated postgraduate area, group study rooms, spaces for collaboration or silent study and a café.

Postgraduate students, alongside academic staff, have exclusive use of the Thomson Reading Room within the Richardson Research Library at Martyrs Kirk, which also includes a space where University collections can be studied.

Several of our academic Schools provide postgraduate research students with their own allocated desks. In the Graduate School building we also provide dedicated desks (often with individual lockers), drop-in study spaces, informal areas for social interaction and a hub for the postgraduate community.

Each academic School has resources tailored to the specific needs of its postgraduate students, whether this is access to materials, laboratories or software. These will vary by subject area, but should you have any specialist requirements your academic School will be happy to help you.

Additional Library spaces

In the centre of town you will have access to St Mary's College Library, which houses collections for Divinity and Medieval History. Located in St Mary's Quadrangle, this also contains the King

James Library, thought to be the oldest library reading room in Scotland.

On the North Haugh the JF Allen Library (Physics & Astronomy building) and the Dr Ettie Stewart Steele Reading Room (Purdie building) both provide study facilities as well as books and journals for science subjects. The Library at the Gateway offers yet more study space, with desks, PCs and more relaxed seating.

With our libraries you can:

- Find study space and gain access to resources in a number of buildings, whether you're working in the town centre, on the North Haugh, or in the Walter Bower House Reading Room on the Eden Campus.
- Access our collection of over one million print volumes, as well as an extensive collection of digital resources, including thousands of journals and e-books, as well theses, newspapers, music, film, television and theatre performances, all of which are available both on and off campus.
- Get expert one-to-one support from specialist Academic Liaison librarians.
- Get help and training on finding the information you need, both online and in person.
- Use our Inter-Library Loan service to access items held at other institutions, and suggest titles for the collection via our Morebooks service.

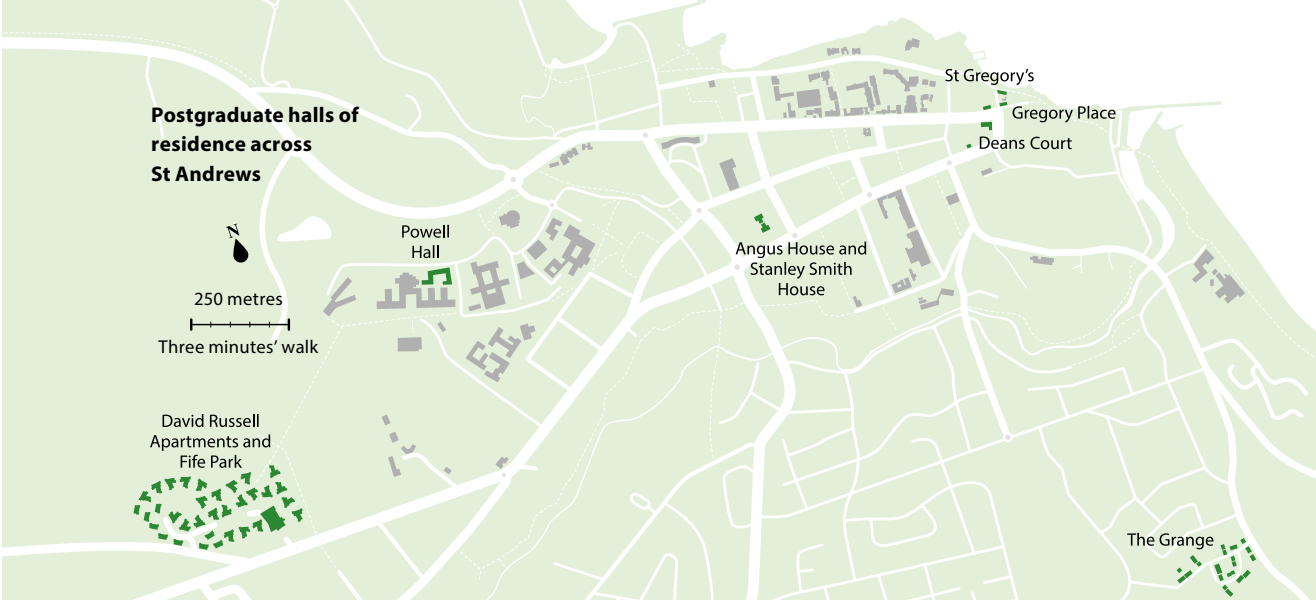

With some of the highest levels of participation in the UK, St Andrews offers students access to top-class sports facilities, a diverse range of sports clubs, advanced support for performance athletes, and a comprehensive range of professional fitness services, exercise classes, and recreational sporting activities.

Club sport

There are over 50 sports clubs at St Andrews, offering both competitive and recreational activities for all levels of ability, aspiration, and commitment across a wide and diverse range of sports. Over 100 teams compete annually in British Universities & Colleges Sport (BUCS), Scottish Student Sport (SSS), local and national leagues and cup competitions, with many students also competing on an individual basis.

Our clubs play a significant part in student life, opening a wealth of experiences, which afford students some of their fondest memories, the chance to foster some of their closest friendships, and opportunities to travel round the UK and further afield.

An application to St Andrews is considered complete when copies of the following documents have been submitted:

- A copy of your CV/résumé.
- Evidence of your qualification(s) (for example, your degree certificate and transcript).
- One signed academic reference.

The reference can be uploaded to your application or you can provide details of your referee who we can contact. Applicants remain responsible for ensuring that references are sent to us.

Some of our programmes require additional written work and proposals, you should check all the requirements of your intended programme on our website for full details. These can include:

- A sample of written academic work.
- A personal statement.
- A research proposal (research programmes).
- A supplementary application form.

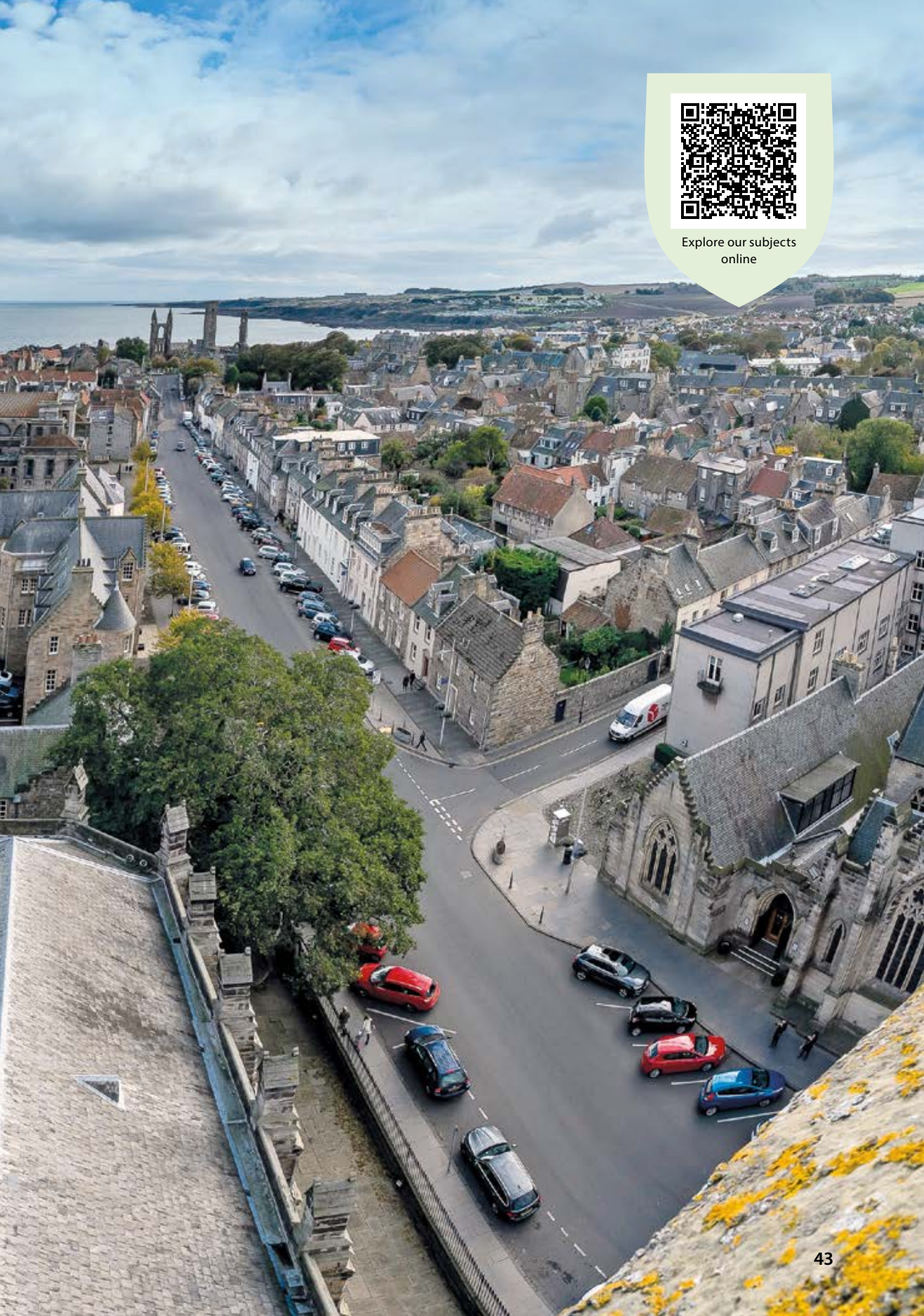

School of Art History

Join one of the largest and most prominent Art History departments in the UK. Teaching and research interests in Art History extend from the medieval to the modern periods, focusing on painting, sculpture, architecture, print culture, and photography. Art History is taught in a relaxed but stimulating atmosphere. You will be part of an active and diverse postgraduate community, offering research seminars, symposia, and collaborations with regional collections.

- Access to the University's historical collections of rare books, photography, and other materials.
- Opportunities to visit art collections in Europe as well as exchange programmes with partner institutions.
- Research centres include: the Centre for Contemporary Art, the Museums, Galleries and Collections Institute, the Institute of Medieval Studies and the St Andrews Scottish Studies Centre.
- Class trips to art museums, studios, and conservation labs.
- Research specialisms by our 39 academic staff include African art; Eighteenth- and Nineteenth-century Art; European and American Modernism; Islamic Art; Medieval and Renaissance Italy; Medieval Europe and the British Isles, including Scotland.

Art History taught programmes: Art History; Digital Art History (online only); History of Photography; Museum and Heritage Studies; Museums, Heritage and Society (online only).

School of Biology

Biology is taught in one of the largest Schools in the University with over 140 Academic staff and postdoctoral research fellows, a combined complement of around 80 PhD students, around 35 taught MSc students (on site) and 82 technical and administrative support staff. There are three major interdisciplinary centres: Biomedical Sciences Research Complex (BSRC), the Centre for Biological Diversity (CBD) and the Scottish Oceans Institute (SOI). Research and teaching activities span from the molecular level to the behaviour of animals in their natural habitats, and the functioning of entire ecosystems.

- Relevant staff specialisations include Behavioural Biology, Bioacoustics, Biochemistry, Biomedical Sciences, Conservation Policy with Management, Ecology, Evolutionary Biology, Infection Biology, Marine Biology, Molecular Biology and Population Biology.
- The BioNetwork provides a great social and academic forum bringing together Masters and PhD students at different stages of their training.
- Postgraduate students are encouraged to get involved in departmental seminars, research group meetings, and informal discussions with staff, postdoctoral researchers and students with similar research interests.

Finance encompasses banking, investments and corporate finance. Our programmes explore key financial concepts, contemporary issues in global financial systems, and cutting-edge methods of financial data analysis.

- You will use quantitative and modelling-based software packages and state-of-the-art data facilities, gaining analytical skills and decision-making abilities.
- Through small group teaching, you will interact closely with a community of academics with research strengths in banking, investments and corporate and household finance.
- Graduates work globally in investment banks, commercial banks, central banks, asset management companies, financial consultancy firms, hedge funds, private equity, large corporations and academia.
- All Finance students can join the Masters Extra (MX) programme which focuses on careers and professional development through a series of talks, workshops, and guest lectures which provide networking opportunities and lead to a Certificate in Career Development.

School of Chemistry

You will receive a fundamental and thorough training in Chemistry with cutting-edge research and support facilities. You will be able to specialise in areas including materials, catalysis, nanotechnology, chemical biology, computational chemistry and surface science. There are strong interdisciplinary links between chemistry and materials science, physics and biomolecular sciences.

- You will join a student population of around 140 research postgraduates and 80 postdoctoral researchers. Chemistry is taught by around 50 full-time academic and academic-related staff and supported by 17 technical staff. There are regular specialist seminars and colloquia by leading researchers from around the world.
- The key areas of research at present are Catalysis and Synthesis; Functional Materials; Chemistry/Biology Interface; Energy, Environmental and Sustainable Chemistry; Synthetic Chemistry and Chemical Dynamics.
- EaSI-CAT (incorporating an EPSRC Centre for Doctoral Training) is a PhD programme co-ordinated by St Andrews with other universities, providing excellent teaching and research opportunities in all areas of catalysis.
- Chemistry graduates have gone on to chemical and pharmaceutical companies such as AstraZeneca, BP, Siemens, GSK and Pfizer.

Classics at St Andrews offers outstanding research by internationally renowned academics in Greek and Latin Literature, Ancient History, Art, Archaeology, Ancient Philosophy and Classical Reception. You will be taught by one of the largest concentrations of classicists in the UK whose research directly informs the material in taught programmes.

Whilst many postgraduate students are initially attracted by the international reputation of the programme, it is the active role that they play in the research community that stays with them.

- Language modules are available at different levels. You may choose to take a pair of modules at beginner or intermediate level in Greek or Latin. For advanced students, there are opportunities to develop your language skills further.
- Current concentrations of expertise include Classical, Hellenistic and Imperial Period Greek Literature; Platonic and Post-classical Philosophy; Greek and Roman archaeology; environmental history and archaeology; Roman Imperial Literature and History; Late Antiquity; engagement with the Classics from the Renaissance to today.

You will receive advanced training in theological or biblical studies, developing your understanding and research skills and addressing questions of faith in the contemporary world. St Andrews has, since 1579, gathered one of the most outstanding communities of internationally-renowned scholars. There are currently around 40 members of staff undertaking research in a wide range of specialisms and approximately 70 postgraduates. The close-knit community of academics and postgraduates provides a context in which to engage in stimulating theological explorations.

- Collaborations, liaisons and networks are a distinctive aspect of the way research has developed here. Scholars come together and share their discoveries on several fronts: Hebrew Bible/Old Testament Studies; New Testament Studies; Church History; Contextual and Practical Theology (including religion and politics); History of Biblical Interpretation; Systematic, Historical, Philosophical and Analytical Theology; Theology and the Arts.
- Postgraduate taught students routinely participate in doctoral research seminars and specially organised colloquia and conferences.

School of Earth & Environmental Sciences

Study broad and important topics such as past and current climate change, sustainable exploration of natural resources, composition of oceans, rivers and the atmosphere; learn practical skills in preparation for the job market.

- You will join a dynamic and research-intensive community with expertise in the fields of environmental science, geology, oceanography, climate, geochemistry, mineralogy, and resource exploration, underpinned by new state-of-the-art laboratory facilities.
- Our research is grouped into three themes: Planets and Life; Climate, Society and Environmental Change; and Earth Resources and Sustainability. Students can apply for our taught MSc courses, MSc Research Programme or for PhD studentships within these themes.
- PhD studentships are available as part of the Training and Research Group for Energy Transition Mineral Resources (TARGET), and the IAPETUS Doctoral Network, two UKRI NERC sponsored Centres for Doctoral Training.
- Taught MSc students in Environmental Science get hands-on training in environmental pollution monitoring with the opportunity to undertake your dissertation as part of an industry placement.
- Graduates have gone on to work in the energy, natural resources and environmental sectors, as well as in the wider science and policy areas.

Statisticians at St Andrews gain the analytical techniques, logical thinking, and deductive reasoning to apply their knowledge to almost any field. You will extrapolate and analyse data to see emerging patterns and apply these to real-life scenarios. Other programmes enable you to apply statistical techniques to understand and monitor wildlife populations, analyse large molecular data sets or estimate stock market probabilities. Regular seminars and colloquia provide fascinating views on the latest research in a diverse array of fields.

- You will join one of the internationally leading research groups in the following areas: Statistical Ecology, Statistical Medicine and Molecular Biology, Machine Learning and Statistics Methodology.
- The Royal Statistical Society (RSS) has accredited the MSc programmes in Statistics, in Applied Statistics and Datamining, and in Data-Intensive Analysis.
- Recent graduates have started careers in large consulting firms and major financial institutions including Scottish and Southern Energy, RBS, Aviva, Lloyds, TSB, PwC, Capital One, American Express, Goldman Sachs, Tesco Bank and many others.

- Health Data Science explores the principles and practice of digital health implementation and allows students to develop applied skills in medical data analysis and use of digital technologies to address healthcare challenges. This interdisciplinary programme has links with the Sir James Mackenzie Institute for Early Diagnosis, giving students access to research across different fields.
- The flexible online Health Professions Education programme is for those interested in developing themselves in a healthcare education role. The programme will cultivate teaching practice which instils the principles and values of interprofessional education to support the development of the future and current healthcare workforce. There are four part-time Health Professions Education elective topics available to be studied as stand-alone modules. These modules allow students to study areas of specific interest.
- Scottish Graduate Entry Medicine (ScotGEM) is a four-year undergraduate Medicine programme specifically designed for graduate entrants. It is a partnership programme tailored to meet the contemporary and future needs of the NHS, with a focus on clinical generalism and rural practice.

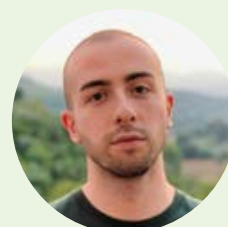

You will examine the global forms and histories of film in all their artistic, documentary and non-theatrical variants, from silent cinema to virtual reality and will cover a range of topics including comedy and activism, as well as numerous genres and filmmakers.

- You will join a multicultural community with strong international academic experience. This cosmopolitan environment allows you to become familiar with cross-cultural issues and to develop personal contacts across Europe, Asia and North America – an important factor in your future specialist development.
- There is a vibrant film culture: from student-led filmmaking marathons and screening series to visits from world-renowned filmmakers and collaborations with international film festivals; you will have numerous opportunities to contribute to a community of cinephiles and film artists.
- Research specialisms by leading staff members include Activism and Advocacy, Documentary, Experimental and Avant-garde Cinemas, Global Film Cultures (archives, cinephilia, film festivals, film industries), Film Genres, Film History (including early cinema), Film Sound and Technologies (including VR and IMAX), Media Theory and History, Eco-cinema, Television, Streaming and Digital Media.

Philosophy is a highly interdisciplinary subject that examines and attempts to answer questions raised by human life and action, by natural science, by the study of art and literature, by the nature of language and communication, and by history.

- There are 35 to 45 taught postgraduate students admitted each year, drawn from the UK and around the world.
- Philosophers work on a wide range of research areas, including Epistemology, History of Philosophy, Logic and the Philosophy of Logic, Philosophical Methodology, Philosophy of Language, Metaphysics, Philosophy of Mind and Perception, Applied Ethics, Ethical Theory, Meta-ethics, Political and Legal Philosophy, Aesthetics and Philosophy of Economics.
- The St Andrews and Stirling Graduate Programme (SASP) is highly regarded internationally.
- There is an annual Reading Party (retreat) in the Scottish Highlands for all taught and research postgraduates and staff.
- One of the most respected international philosophy journals, *The Philosophical Quarterly*, is edited from St Andrews.

As a student of Social Anthropology, you will explore the rich diversity of ways humans establish and live social lives in the contemporary world. Knowledge of what it means to be human is always contested – you will learn how anthropology is a dynamic field of inquiry constantly generating new priorities and theories.

- Ethnographic fieldwork is the primary method helping anthropologists deepen our knowledge of the world and those we share it with. It can take place anywhere people are building a social life together.
- As a researcher you will develop a familiarity with field ethnography alongside a range of methods for representing and analysing data, including primary and secondary texts, film and other visual media, and oral and auditory sources.
- Research here is especially concerned with methodological experimentation toward understanding and comparing human social experience worldwide. Regional specialisms include: East and West Africa, the Pacific, South America, the Caribbean, Europe, Central and East Asia.

- Diverse portfolio of teaching modules, covering observational, theoretical, and computational aspects.
- Two research projects are included as part of the MSc Astrophysics programme.

Psychology

Psychology at St Andrews focuses on the understanding of perception, cognition, motivation and behaviour at several different levels. Areas of research and teaching range from the study of the neural system to complex social interactions of humans and animals.

- You will join a community of approximately 50 academic staff, 80 postgraduate students, 15 postdoctoral researchers and 17 technicians and professional staff from around the world.
- You will have access to some of the best psychological laboratory facilities in the UK.
- Considerable contact time with researchers occurs via small group tutorials and research project supervision.
- Key research themes are Origins of Mind (including comparative psychological research on non-human primates and developmental psychology of infants and children), perception, cognition, memory, motivation, learning, emotion, action, and social and group processes.

Psychology taught programmes: Origins of Mind Evolutionary and Developmental Perspectives; Psychology (Conversion); Research Methods in Psychology; Psychology of Dementia Care (online only).

Neuroscience

Learn the science behind how the brain and the nervous system work, focusing on the scientific understanding of the nervous system from genes to behaviour.

- Explore topics including the neural control of movement, neuroethology, memory and disorders of the nervous system, such as motor neuron disease (ALS).
- Research is organised broadly around key themes in neuroscience, including Cellular, Behavioural and Cognitive Neuroscience.
- At St Andrews, you will gain an understanding of neuroscience from the level of single proteins to higher brain functions such as memory formation and cognitive processing. You will also have access to state-of-the-art facilities to learn crucial laboratory skills and gain hands-on experience running your own experiments.
- You will conduct a year-long research project and learn relevant techniques and skills through coursework. Research projects are carried out in a single laboratory over the full length of the programme, giving students a unique opportunity to pursue research questions in depth. The overall aim is to help students acquire the skills needed to succeed as independent research scientists.

Digital Education

Digital education is a rapidly expanding field, and it is becoming crucial to the delivery of education in all contexts. There is therefore a growing need for practitioners to explore in depth the various concepts, opportunities and challenges associated with delivering education digitally. This programme will provide both a theoretical underpinning and an opportunity to consider the practical applications of digital education.

- Discuss theoretical concepts and frameworks in small groups and in writing in online forums with students studying both in St Andrews and around the world, and apply these through theoretical and more practical assessments.

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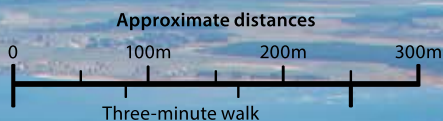
